100 log truck loads of firewood in the last month. That is over 2,500 tons equivalent to 5,000,000 pounds of fuel.



Projects From the Past: 2003

Tulare County Weed Eradication and Education Program California Department of Conservation



In January 2003, TCRC D received a grant from the California Department of Conservation to assist in the implementation of an Arundo (a highly invasive riparian weed) eradication plan and for the purchase and design of noxious weeds of Tulare County tabletop display. The Sequoia Riverlands Trust partnered with a cash-match, and the National Park Service and the Army Corps of Engineers offered in-kind services in the form of GIS expertise and labor for weed removal. A baseline mapping effort on the Kaweah River in the community of Three Rivers was completed in the spring of 2004. A display board was developed focusing on the identification and control of weeds, focusing on an integrated pest management approach (chemical, biological, and mechanical methods).
